Parashas Vaeschanan – Shabbos Nachamu and Tishah B'Av

This week, we commemorated Tishah B'Av, the saddest day of the Hebrew Calendar, when both of our Temples were destroyed, in addition to several other less than delightful occurrences. The first "Bais HaMikdash" of David, who conceived the idea, and Shlomo, who implemented it, was destroyed by the Babylonians, mainly because the Children of Israel could not overcome their desires for idol worship, illicit sexual relationships and the taking of human life for no good reason. And the Romans destroyed the Second Temple, which was built by Ezra, Nechemiah and Zerubavel, with spiritual support from the prophets Chaggai, Zechariah and Malachi, and political support from Mordechai and Esther, under the aegis of King Darius of Persia, the son of Esther. According to the Talmud, the reason for its destruction was "Sinat Chinam," Causeless Hatred, and the inability to empathize with one's fellow human beings.

Some of the builders of the Second Temple (with the possible exception of Esther) were the same as those creative religious thinkers who were instrumental in passing along the Chain of Mesorah, which originated at Sinai, and passed from Moshe to Yehoshua to the Elders to the Prophets and thence to the "Anshei K'nesses HaGedolah." They used some of their skill in construction to organize and develop the "Torah she-B'al Peh," the Oral Law.

Tishah B'Av, the Ninth Day of the Month of Av, is called a "Mo'ed," based on the following verses in Megilas Eichah: "...He has called a 'Mo'ed' against me to crush my young men..." (Eichah 1:15) and "They (the enemies of Israel) have made a noise in the House of the Lord, as on a day of 'Mo'ed' " (Eichah 2:7), both verses indicating that the word means a day of joyous assembly for the enemies of Israel. And in fact, in recent weeks, there does seem to be a very negative trend against the Jewish People, as in the wanton murder of little Leiby Kletzky of Boro Park, and the equally horrendous murder of Rabbi Elazar Abuchatzaira of Be'er Sheva, and the demonstration by some 250,000 Jews in Israel in protest against the high cost of living in that country.

But we must remember that the word "Mo'ed" in itself, while always meaning a "joyous festival," most often means a "joyous festival" for the Jewish People. And indeed, all of the happy occasions in Jewish life, such as Shabbos, Pesach, Shavuot and Succos, are referred to as "Mo'adim" in Parashas Emor, "...the Mo'adim of HaShem...these are My 'Mo'adim' " (Vayikra 23:2) And bear in mind that we are promised by HaShem that Tishah B'Av itself will ultimately be celebrated as a "Mo'ed" in the Third Temple.

I have the pleasure of working with a scholar and gentleman, Mr. Felix Lehmann, who often comes out with insightful remarks. For example, he recently pointed out that a true "Yarei Shamayim" must of necessity have an optimistic nature, based on his "bitachon," trust, in HaShem. He also noted that Yerushalayim is described in the first verse of Eichah as "sitting in solitude" and the Hebrew word "Badad," spelled "Bais," "Dalet," "Dalet" is used. That word has the "Gematria" of Ten, showing that even in her low moments, Yerushalayim always has a "Minyan," a quorum of ten prayerful Jews. Let us hope that this optimistic potential of Tishah B'Av is soon realized: As it says, "For HaShem has comforted Tziyon, He has comforted all her ruins, and He will make her Wilderness an Eden, and its bare plain as a Garden of HaShem."

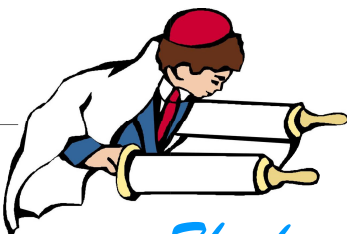
